

CHURCH LETTER

Dear Friends,

The late Archbishop Anthony Bloom of the Russian Orthodox Church told the story of a woman who came to see him and said, “I have been praying all my life, but I have never experienced God. What should I do?” He advised her to go home and tidy her room and sit still for twenty minutes. “And whatever you do, he warned her, “Don’t pray”. So, she went home and tidied her room and sat still. Curiously, for the first time in a long time she discovered that she had time to look at her room and appreciate it and notice the colours and the items in front of her. She began to notice the ticking of her clock. The silence grew deeper and she felt herself slipping into prayer, but she knew this was the one thing she wasn’t allowed to do. So, she took out her knitting and what with the ticking of the clock and the clicking of her needles the silence grew more profound until at the heart of the silence she became aware of a presence....

What Archbishop Bloom’s advice teaches us is how much what we call faith begins with `awareness` or what we sometimes call `contemplation`. People sometimes think this means making the mind blank, closing our eyes and shutting out the world to `contemplate our navel`. But on the contrary, contemplation means opening our eyes, becoming aware of the world and it’s all too often hidden depths. Someone called it, `a long loving look at the real`.

This contemplative spirit, it seems to me, is a pretty indispensable gateway to encounter with God. It’s not so much a matter of striving to conjure up religious experience but becoming present. Praying, as that woman discovered, is much more like `paying attention`.

In one of my favourite Gospel stories Jesus asked a blind beggar called Bartimaeus what he wanted. He replied, “I want to see again” (Mark 10.51). In one sense this is a statement of the obvious and yet it has a deeper significance because it’s the plea of someone who had lost his way, not just physically but who couldn’t see where his life was going. Pointedly, on being healed, Bartimaeus got up and followed Jesus `on the way`.

So, in praying we take Archbishop Bloom’s advice and put ourselves in a place where we can pay attention to the world around us. With Bartimaeus we ask to receive the sight we need to live more fully and deeply, rather than stumble blindly through each day. Michael Paul Gallagher SJ says that to pray is “To relax into the reality of being loved by God... and rising to the realism of loving like Christ”.

Our setting is reasonably small, taking up to 12 children at present, and is set within Inkpen village primary school. Our primary objective for children is creating a happy and relaxed environment, enabling them to explore and learn independently. Children have access to many of the school's facilities giving them several outdoor spaces to play in, including nearby woodlands when doing forest school.

We welcome children from their third birthday and also accept West Berkshire grant funding. **We are open Monday's, Tuesday's and Thursday's 9am – 3pm.** We are flexible with sessions (half day or whole day) and can also accommodate split funding with other providers.

PLAYING FIELD TRUST UPDATE (IMPFT)

A huge thank you to Peter Kersey who spent a weekend on a digger, first, on Saturday clearing the woodland playground area and removing the mound in the existing playground ready for the roundabout and then on Sunday clearing the ditch at the bottom of the playing field to enable the drainage pipes to work. Thank you also to Bruce Armstrong who did an enormous amount of work in preparation for the ditch clearing along with the help from Simon Hanna and other volunteers. Thanks also must go to Bob May who kindly funded the digger.

The Woodland Playground: Lucy Ryan kindly spent Saturday mapping out the woodland playground area and worked with Peter to put a structure to the area. The plan now is to treat the weeds throughout the spring and summer in order to have the ground ready for planting in the autumn and put in place the play equipment if we have the required funds. If you would like more information regarding the plans for the Woodland Playground, please do get in touch with any of the IMPFT Trustees. Apologies for the mud in the playground where the mound was. This is in preparation for the installation of the roundabout.

The Pavilion: The amended plans (to add toilets to existing changing room area and referee changing room) have been submitted to West Berkshire Planning. Building tenders will shortly be given to four builders to quote on. We ideally need to start building in April as we have two key deadlines; The Greenham Trust require us to start in April to meet the terms of their £65,000 match funding. We also need to start then to enable the bats to be rehoused otherwise we will have to

delay until September. It is therefore important that we raise the remaining required funds for the pavilion of £45,000. POLICE UPDATE

Our Community Police Officer, Joanna King, writes: “The team carried out two successful Tool marking events in the last month. One in Lambourn and one at John O Gaunt school Hungerford. In total we’ve marked approximately 100 tools. We are currently planning future dates to offer Bike and Tack marking as well as tools. We have booked in another event in Lambourn on the square for the 1st Feb 1100-1400hrs and another in **Hungerford on the 20th Feb 1100-1400hrs**. Location for the Hungerford event is still to be confirmed but will likely be the car park at Howdens Charnham Street Hungerford. These will be advertised and also posted on our social media platforms in due course.

Date for your diary – Sunday 1st March sees the start of a regular rural “Have Your Say”, whereby our Mobile Police Station will be making pit stops in the rural villages in our policing area. Therefore, we will be in the car park of the Inkpen Sports Pavilion between 1330 – 1430hrs.

At the beginning of December, we finally took delivery of our new marked 4x4 vehicle. This will allow us to patrol the rural areas we have been struggling to reach, and better serve our most rural communities with a visible presence.

I am pleased to report that there has been little reported crime in Inkpen. However, one crime of note was a report of lead being stolen from the roof of a Conservatory, sometime between 30th Dec and 2nd January.

Mobile Library: will call in Inkpen at Craven Rd. from 2.30 – 2.50pm and at Inkpen School from 3.05 to 4pm on 18th February and 10th March 2020. Please support the rural service as we do not wish to lose it.

Junior Football Coaching: Oliver will be coaching on **Saturday 1st February** at Inkpen Playing Field at 2pm. Wear trainers please and ideally gloves as it will be on the tennis court again until the weather improves. If you can help please contact the parish clerk – details below.

Climate Change Emergency/Strategy: WBC declared a ‘Climate Emergency’ in July 2019 and held a conference in October to highlight some of the challenges. Please respond to the draft ‘Environment Strategy’ consultation, which is on the West Berkshire Council website. Please let the Parish Council know if there are specific initiatives that you wish to take forward as a village.

Ditches & Watercourses: Please can everyone take responsibility for clearing the ditches and watercourses adjacent to their property. During this extremely wet weather it is important to maintain the flow of water and not to cause unnecessary flooding to neighbouring landowners.

Byway 46: The ditch at the bottom of the playing field has been cleaned to allow the water to drain off the field and into the ditch. There are drainage pipes leading into the ditch that were blocked and did not allow the water to drain – this means that the path may be a bit muddy until the weather settles down.

Great British Spring Clean: Please note this event is scheduled for **20th March to 13th April** – it would be great to get Inkpen involved. Thanks to those in the village who pick up litter regularly.

Dog Mess: To all dog walkers please observe the ‘country code’ and ‘pick it up’ as some dog owners are not acting responsibly and sadly it leaves the playing field unfit for games and leisure activities. Please keep dogs under control when there is a football match on the playing field.
