Facts and figures as of this week

- **2,758** shielded* residents of West Berkshire are registered on the government's website, out of a total of **4,357** identified by the NHS
- Nearly 82% of shielded residents registered have now indicated they do <u>NOT</u> require support
- 355 shielded residents are receiving Government food parcels a significant reduction from 574 on June 4th
- 2,673 residents have been contacted by council officers and 15 police welfare visits have been carried out where our calls or emails were not answered
- 69% of all requests for Hub assistance were from shielded residents
- 73% of the requests related to food and medicine



- As of Thursday July 9th there have been 474 lab confirmed cases of coronavirus in West Berkshire, an increase of 3 cases since last week. This includes testing results from pillar one (swab testing in Public Health England labs and NHS hospitals for those with a clinical need, and health and care workers) and pillar two data (swab testing for the wider population, as set out in government guidance on testing).
- The coronavirus infection rate of 299 in West Berkshire is lower than the regional average (South East) of 372.6 and the national rate of 442. Rates are calculated by the amount of confirmed cases for each area divided by the total population and multiplied by 100,000. Rates are used to compare different areas and account for different population sizes.

*Shielded people are those who have received a letter from the NHS telling them they must stay at home because their health condition makes them extremely vulnerable to Covid-19. The shielded list is under constant review by GPs and hospital clinicians, and they are responsible for informing people that they have been removed from the list. Shielding guidance is due to be 'paused' at the end of July but the list will continue to be maintained and data will be provided to local authorities in case of a local outbreak of Covid-19. Draft Recovery Strategy published by West Berkshire Council



The Strategy, which will be considered by councillors at Executive on July 16th, sets out the Council's priority focus areas to help the community recover as quickly as possible from the effects of the Covid-19 outbreak. The proposed Strategy is structured around three core elements - health, education and the local economy - and gives details of how the council and its partners aim to improve the quality of life of all of those who live or work in the district.

In line with the council's commitment to enhanced community engagement, there is a strong emphasis on plans to inform, consult and involve local residents in the development and delivery of these local recovery plans. The council has also published its Recovery Action Plan as an appendix to the Strategy. This provides information about what has been done to date to support the local recovery in each of the three priority areas as well as further planned actions. West Berkshire's Covid-19 Local Outbreak Control Plan

Results are in from the Residents Survey on the impact of Covid-19

Almost 3,300 district residents responded to the Council's survey in May to understand how communities are feeling about the impact of Covid-19 on their health and finances, the environment and on the wider community. The survey also asked respondents whether they had volunteered in their community as a result of the pandemic, as well as whether they intended to in the future.



Key findings included:

- Awareness of the Community Support Hub was fairly high, at 72%.
- 86.5% thought the council's response to Covid-19 was either excellent, good or fair. 8.8% declined to answer with 4.7% judging it to be poor.
- 70.8% said they have volunteered during the pandemic and 78.2% of these intend to continue doing so.

Schools Food Survey is underway to further understand food needs across the district



The Community Support Hub has written to Head Teachers across the district to better understand the role that schools have been playing in the distribution of food parcels to their vulnerable families during the Covid-19 pandemic (outside of the Free School Meals provision already in place). The information will be used to help food providers more fully understand the level of food need in the district and how this can be addressed going forward. The Community Support Hub will be meeting with food providers on July 22nd to share the findings of this survey.

Updated National Guidance from the Government

Government plan for controlling future Covid-19 outbreaks - The Government's approach, as announced by the Prime Minister on Friday, July 3rd, is made up of five principle components:

1. Monitoring. Public Health England, working with the Joint Biosecurity Centre, will examine carefully data on the spread of the disease and people's behaviour across the country.



2. Engagement. If monitoring identifies local problems, NHS Test and Trace and PHE will work with the relevant local authority to develop a deeper understanding of the problem and identify solutions.

3. Testing. Scaled-up testing at a local level, combined with contract tracing through NHS Test and Trace, can control the virus and thus avoid more stringent measures.

4. Targeted restrictions. If the virus continues to spread, activities will be restricted at particular locations and close individual premises.

5. Local lockdown. If the previous measures have not proven to be enough, local lockdowns will be introduced, extending across whole communities. Local lockdowns will be carefully calibrated depending on the scientific and specific circumstances of each outbreak and smarter means of containing the virus are continually being explored.

Shielding Update - The <u>Government's guidance for those shielding</u> was updated on July 8th. From August 1st 2020, people in England who are at high risk from coronavirus will no longer be advised to shield unless the transmission of COVID-19 in the community starts to rise significantly.



As of July 6th, those shielding are advised that they no longer need to socially distance from people they live with. If they want to, they can meet in a group of up to 6 people outdoors, including people from other households. They may also form a 'support bubble' with one other household if they want to, but one of the households in the 'support bubble' should be a single adult household (either an adult living alone or with children under 18 only).

The government support offer has been extended: those shielding can still get a food box, care and/or medicine delivery until July 31st if they want them, and have registered online by July 17th.

The latest evidence indicates that the risk of serious illness for most children and young people is low. The majority of children currently

considered extremely clinical vulnerable to COVID-19 will be able to be removed from the shielded patient list as of July 8th. A clinical discussion with a paediatric specialist or GP will be needed before any child or young person is removed from the shielded patient list.

Phased Reopening of Libraries and Extended At Home Library Service

West Berkshire Council will be restoring its library service to the public and staff on a phased reopening to keep everyone safe. From July 13th the first stage will be to re-open Newbury, Hungerford and Thatcham Libraries for book collections during limited opening hours. We hope to open our other libraries on the same basis the following week.



In addition, West Berkshire At Home Library Service is extending its delivery service to include those who are self-isolating from Covid-19. Books and Spoken Word CDs will be exchanged at home doorsteps at a pre-arranged time every 3 weeks with no face to face contact. It is not necessary to be a library member to sign up for the service and there are no library fines.
