In 1804 he moved to HMS *Neptune* and in 1805 commanded a unit of Sea Fencibles at Gosport, returning to *Neptune* in 1807. In 1809, Williams was promoted to rear-admiral and sailed in HMS *Venerable* and HMS *Hannibal* in the Channel Fleet and then at Lisbon. In 1811 he returned to Britain and took command of HMS *Royal George* and became Commander-in-Chief, The Nore. He remained in that position until 1814, retiring as a vice-admiral and establishing the <u>Naval Female School</u> as his final act, donating £1,000 to the school's endowment (the equivalent of £70,500 as of 2020).

EDWARD RICHARD WILLIAMS entered the Navy, in May, 1804, as a Volunteer, on board the NEPTUNE 98, Capt. Sir Thos. Williams, in which ship he was for 12 months employed in the Channel.

HMS *Neptune* was a 98-gun <u>second rate ship of the line</u> of the <u>Royal Navy</u>. She served on a number of stations during the <u>French Revolutionary</u> and <u>Napoleonic Wars</u> and was present at the <u>Battle of Trafalgar</u> in 1805.

Neptune was built during the early years of the war with <u>Revolutionary France</u> and was launched in 1797. She almost immediately became caught up in the events of the <u>mutiny at the Nore</u>, and was one of a few loyal ships tasked with attacking mutinous vessels if they could not be brought to order. The mutiny died out before this became necessary and *Neptune* joined the <u>Channel Fleet</u>. She moved to the Mediterranean in 1799, spending the rest of the French Revolutionary Wars in operations with Vice-Admiral Lord Keith's fleet. After refitting, and spending time on blockades, she formed part of <u>Lord Nelson's</u> fleet at the Battle of Trafalgar, and was heavily involved in the fighting, sustaining casualties of 10 killed and 34 wounded.
